


The Mass

Tanya looked around nervously. "I've never been to Mass before," she whispered to Lisa. "What if I do something wrong? How do I know what to do when?"

Gather Together

We come together in church for Mass to remember Jesus, "Do this in memory of me" (Luke 22:19) and because Jesus said, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matthew 18:20).

Mass begins with a gathering song. We sing together as the priest and ministers enter in a **procession**. The priest begins the celebration of the Mass by making the Sign of the Cross. This shows we all belong to God's family. He asks us to remember our sins. We ask God to forgive us.

Next, we sing or say the *Gloria*, an ancient Christian song of praise. We say, "Glory to God in the highest," just like the angels sang at Christmas. Then the priest says another short prayer.

Listen to God's Word

Now we sit and listen to a reading from the Bible, God's word. This part of the Mass is called the


Liturgy of the Word. The book of Mass readings is called a *Lectionary*. We hear three readings during Sunday Mass and two during weekday Mass.

In the first reading, we hear stories of God's love and mercy from the Old Testament. Then we sing the **Responsorial Psalm**. The psalms are prayer-poems that

the Jewish people sing to God.

The second reading tells us how the early Church lived and prayed. After that reading, we stand and sing "Alleluia" before the final reading, the Gospel. **Alleluia** means "praise God" and *gospel* means "good news." So we praise God for his good news during this reading.

After the Gospel, the priest explains the readings in his homily. The **homily** teaches us what God's word means and how it applies to our lives today.

Share and Pray

We share things about our lives with our families. We also ask our families for help when we're stuck or feeling bad. Our Church community is like a really big extended family. So during the Universal Prayer our Church family shares its concerns and problems, too. We pray together for our needs and the needs of others. We ask God to help and heal us. We hear requests, called petitions, and hold these prayers in our hearts.

Next, we get ready for the **Liturgy of the Eucharist**. *Eucharist* means "thanksgiving" and is another name for holy Communion. Just like your family gets together to share a meal, we share a meal at Mass with our Church family!

Before our meal, we bring gifts to God. This part of the Mass is called the **offertory** because we're offering things to God. The money placed into the basket helps the Church and the needy. The bread and wine that are carried to the altar become the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ.

After receiving the bread and wine, the priest asks God to accept and bless these gifts in the **eucharistic prayer**. We praise God again with the **Holy, Holy, Holy**: "Holy, holy, holy, Lord God of hosts. Heaven and earth are full of your glory! Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest" (see Mark 11:7–11).

The priest, acting in the person of Jesus, says as Jesus said: "This is my body" and "this is my blood" (Mark 14:22, 24). We believe this is really Jesus Christ in the

bread and wine.

We stand and pray the Our Father as one community in the Lord. As a tangible sign of the unity initiated by Christ, we say to those around us, "Peace be with you." We may also shake hands or hug each other.

Eat and Drink Together

We line up to receive the Eucharist, the true Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. When we eat this bread and drink this wine, our Lord's presence makes us more like him. After Communion, we silently thank God for coming to us.

After everyone has gone to Communion and after a final blessing, the Mass has ended. The priest says, "Go in peace." We reply, "Thanks be to God." We are proud to go out and share God with the world.

The process by which adults are initiated into the Catholic faith throughout the United States is now called the OCIA—the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. "Order" is a clearer translation of the Latin term for the process formerly known as the RCIA—the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. People preparing for baptism and reception into the Church celebrate several rites as part of the order to which those rites belong—an order whose mission is to journey in the faith. The US Conference of Catholic Bishops adopted the name change in 2021, with American dioceses introducing the name thereafter. For more information, please contact your local diocese.

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
