
When you are baptized, you become a member of a family. Like any family, the Catholic Church has a lot of members. Every one of us has an important role and unique work to do. Jesus' work is to watch over the Church and to lead and guide all the members toward God.


Here are some members of the Church and the work they are called to do.

The Pope

Jesus chose twelve apostles to help him bring people to God. To one he said, "You are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church" (Matthew 16:18). Peter worked with the other apostles to build the Christian Church around the world.


Peter's job is now done by his successor, the pope. The **pope** watches over and guides the Church in the world. Just like Peter worked with the apostles, the pope works with the bishops. The bishops are the successors of the other apostles.





Bishops

A **bishop** is in charge of all the parishes in a city or area. This area is called a **diocese**. A large diocese is called an **archdiocese**.



If you live in an archdiocese, your bishop is called an **archbishop**. For really large dioceses, the bishop may have an **auxiliary bishop**. Auxiliary means "helper."

Sometimes the pope chooses a bishop to become a **cardinal**. It's the job of the cardinals to vote for a new pope.

Priests

The bishops can't take care of many parishes and people alone. **Priests** help bishops at individual parishes. A priest who is in charge of his own parish is called a **pastor**. That word comes from the Latin word for "shepherd." So a pastor is like your shepherd in faith. Large parishes might have an **associate pastor** who helps the pastor.

Not all priests are in charge of a parish. Some travel to faraway lands to spread the word of God. Others teach in schools. Some priests work with the poor, and some priests care for the sick.

Deacons

A **deacon** helps priests by reading the Gospel or giving the homily at Mass, helping with the poor and sick in the parish, and a lot of other things. Although a deacon's ministry is more limited than a priest's, some of the things a deacon can do are: preach at Mass, baptize, and preside at weddings.

Sisters and Brothers

Some people devote their lives to God in a special way by becoming part of a religious order. A **religious order** is a group of men or women who share a common mission (like preaching, teaching, praying, or serving the needy). They promise to always obey God and their community and to live simply without a lot of stuff.

Religious men are called brothers or monks and may live in a monastery. Religious women are called sisters or nuns and may live in a convent. Whether they live together or alone, they promise never to marry.



Laity

The largest part of the body of Christ is called the **laity**. The primary purpose of the laity is to bring Christ into their homes and workplaces. Ultimately, it is the job of the laity to work in transforming the world for Christ.

- **Lectors** proclaim the Bible readings from the *Lectionary* aloud at Mass.
- Altar servers assist the priest during Mass and other celebrations. They may carry a cross or a candle, hold the book of prayers, and even help prepare for Communion.
- Extraordinary ministers of holy Communion: They are named to administer the Eucharist after it has been "made sacred" by a priest or the person celebrating the Mass.
- Music ministers lead the singing and play instruments at Mass and other celebrations. A cantor is the lead singer.
- Ushers greet people before and after Mass, help them find a seat, and collect the offertory gifts. They might also assist with the Communion lines.

The process by which adults are initiated into the Catholic faith throughout the United States is now called the OCIA—the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults. "Order" is a clearer translation of the Latin term for the process formerly known as the RCIA—the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults.
