The Precepts of the Catholic Church

As Catholics, we live ships - first, with God,

and then, with one another as community of disciples (the Church, giving witness to the world with the intent of making other disciples).

The precepts of the Church spell out for us these relationships in the context of a moral life bound to and nourished by liturgical life. The obligatory character of these positive laws decreed by the pastoral authorities is meant to guarantee to the faithful the very necessary minimum in the spirit of prayer and moral effort, in the growth in love of God and neighbor:

- You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor. To observe the Sabbath has two-fold effect: using our God-given freedom, we worship God and sanctify the world. Sunday reminds us of our task to recognize the holiness of God and sacred work that God has shared with us. From a relational perspective, we nurture your relationship with Jesus by regularly spending time with him.
- You shall confess your sins at least once a year. Through the Sacrament of Reconciliation, we recognize that our relationship with Jesus entails ongoing conversion and forgiveness - as disciples, we seek to become holier. From a relational perspective, we say yes to holiness through ongoing reconciliation.
- You shall receive the sacrament of the Eucharist at least during the Easter season. The Easter season is so important that it requires a minimum encounter with Jesus. His resurrection is a singular event that has brought defeat to sin and death. From a relational perspective, our life revolves around Jesus; we the Body celebrate the important milestones in the life of Jesus our Head.
- You shall observe the days of fasting and abstinence established by the Church. Our practice of fasting and abstinence shows our mastery over our instincts and desires, our capacity to see and value God the Giver over His gifts. From a relational perspective, we make self-sacrifices for loved ones we forego some good so that we benefit from more good.
- You shall help to provide for the needs of the Church. Jesus entrusted us his mission. This is why we exist as his Church: to do his work. From a relational perspective, our love for Jesus leads to love our neighbor.

Spiritual Exercise 2

Inspired by this Sunday's Parable of the Good Samaritan, let us focus and reflect on the word, "neighbor," and ponder on the question, "Who is

my neighbor?"

As we journey with one another, it is important that we know our fellow pilgrims. Remember Helen and Janet's story from the parish magazine - how they took the courage to get to know each other after sitting next to each other in the same pew Sunday after Sunday after Sunday?

Spiritual Exercise 2 - What is a simple way to know our fellow pilgrims? If you do not know the name of a person who sits next to you on Sunday, please introduce yourself and share with this person something about you. Also, ask if you can take a selfie of yourselves together. See if this person has any concern that he or she may want you to pray for. Let your selfie, remind you to pray for your fellow pilgrim and his/her prayer intention.

Thank you, Paul Then and Todd Gillenkirk, for providing update about the parish Synod listening sessions and the planned ongoing discussions.

To facilitate ongoing discussions in the parish, we will be using the monthly Coffee Hour as the proper platform. Why do we need ongoing conversation in the parish? Because the listening sessions yielded very low participation (27 out of 5583 or .005%) - we hope that many more will get involved. And because of some misconceptions, both doctrinal and non -doctrinal, that need to be better understood and responded to - to address these effectively, two-way communication has to happen. So, let us be companions on the journey.



2021-22 Capital Projects

This past Spring, we were able to complete the following capital projects:

- Repair on the brick work on the exterior walls and pilasters (southern side) of the church,
- Re-stucco the exterior wall of the eastern side of the church,

- Repointing of the church and parish office chimneys,
- Repair and repainting of the exterior walls and woodwork of the parish office,
- Replacement of the plexi-glass covers of the church stained glass windows,
- Replacement of the church basement windows,
- Resurface the front church steps,
- Maintenance work on the church roof, and
- Repair on the Hogan House roof.

Let there be light...

Be Attentive to Others. Be a Neighbor.

There was a scholar of the law who stood up to test Jesus and said, "Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read it?" He said in reply, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself." He replied to him, "You have answered correctly; do this and you will live.?

The scholar of the Law asked Jesus a very important question, which touches on why God has bothered to speak with us through His words, commandments, and interactions with certain Biblical figures. God speaks to reveal His heart to us, to guide us and lead us to Himself or in the words of the scholar, "inherit eternal life." The scholar's response to Jesus summarized the entire Law into the love of God and neigh-

- Luke 10:25-28

But because he wished to justify himself, he said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man fell victim to robbers as he went down from Jerusalem to Jericho. They stripped and beat him and went off leaving him half-dead. A priest happened to be going down that road, but when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side. Likewise a Levite came to the place, and when he saw him, he passed by on the opposite side..." - Luke 10:29-32

Their exchange led them ask and identify what a neighbor is. Jesus provided an answer through the Parable of the Good Samaritan. In the parable, it was not the priest and the Levite who were coming from Jerusalem who were neighbors to the man. Although they had finished their ritual tasks (going down the road) and there was no real concern about becoming impure, the priest and the Levite-both Jews-chose to ignore the man.

"...But a Samaritan traveler who came upon him was moved with compassion at the sight. He approached the victim, poured oil and wine over his wounds and bandaged them. Then he lifted him up on his own animal, took him to an inn, and cared for him. The next day he took out two silver coins and gave them to the innkeeper with the instruction, Take care of him. If you spend more than what I have given you, I shall repay you on my way back."

- Luke 10:33-35

Unexpectedly, it was a religious 'enemy'—a Samaritan, who had compassion for the man and acted towards the wellbeing of the man.



"...Which of these three, in your opinion, was neighbor to the robbers' victim?" He answered, "The one who treated him with mercy."

Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

- Luke 10:17-20

Take note how Jesus identified the man in His final question to the scholar of the Law - the robber's victim. Also, Jesus did not anymore specify the other three characters. In relation to the robber's victim, Jesus simply wanted the scholar to identify the neighbor. In the hour of need for the robber's victim, the neighbor was simply identify as the one who acknowledged his actual need and provided the necessary and corresponding help.

Being fellow pilgrims who follow Jesus, how much do we pay attention to our neighbor? If I sit in the same pew Sunday after Sunday, do I know the names of those seated next to me? Do I intentionally know them beyond their names? Do I know what is happening in their lives? Do I take the time to genuinely ask them how they are doing?

For the second spiritual exercise, get to know a fellow parishioner - one who sits next to you at Mass. Ask you could take a selfie together. Allow the selfie to remind you to pray for him or her.

So, good pilgrimage. Good journey. Buen camino!
