Sacrament of Reconciliation. The sacrament through which God's mercy and love, justice and truth heals the wound of human sin. *Generally offered an hour before each Mass*. Please give the priest fifteen minutes before Mass to prepare for Mass.

Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. The sacrament through which Jesus continues to heal the sick among us. Anointing is offered at each Mass on the first weekend of the month. Or call Fr. Edison @ 924-7111 to schedule an anointing.

Sacrament of Marriage. The sacrament through which God calls a man and woman to become visible signs of His Love. Call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111 for more info.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. The sacrament through which the mission Jesus entrusted to the apostles is continued in the Church. To learn more about vocations to the ordained ministry, please call Fr. Edison or Deacon John @ 924-7111.

The Gospel this Sunday and the upcoming weekends focus on the unparalleled commitment

of our friendship with Jesus - our relationship with Him is above any relationship we have with one another, and it is a friendship ever seeks to be perfected through ongoing conversion and reconciliation.

As we walk the Eucharistic pilgrimage - whether when we are alone with Jesus or with fellow pilgrims, may we find ourselves getting to know Jesus and our fellow disciples more and more and seek to strengthen these friendships.

For the sixth spiritual exercise, renew and strengthen your friendships with Jesus and with fellow disciples by seeking forgiveness and offering forgiveness.

- When was the last time you received the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation? Do you know that the Church asks us to celebrate it at least once a year? If you wish, you may celebrate it more often, like once a month.
- Is there anything that is keeping you away from the sacrament? Would you consider placing this concern in Jesus' hands and allow Him to do something about it? Consider discussing this with me, too.
- What draws you towards the sacrament? How does the sacrament help you strengthen your friendship with Jesus and with fellow disciples (aka His Church)?

Do you need help (review) on how the Sacrament of Penance and Reconciliation is celebrated? Check out the Confession icon on our parish app. If you need to download the app, text 'App' to 55321. Or simply ask me to guide you through the sacrament in the Confessional.

Remember "...forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us..."

Thank you for going through these spiritual exercises. On the surface, the exercises are too simple. But when developed as habits, consistently done, these exercises can make us better and holier disciples.

In the Spirit of Accompaniment

Peter said to him in reply, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come."

But when he saw how strong the wind was he became frightened; and, beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus stretched out

his hand and caught him, and said to him, "O you of little faith, why did you doubt?" After they got into the boat, the wind died down. Those who were in the boat did him homage, saying, "Truly, you are the Son of God." - Matthew 14:28-33

- Because of this incident on the Sea of Galilee, the boat has been adopted by early Christian as a symbol for the Church. To this day, one may find 1st cent AD carved graffities of boats on rocks along the shores of Galilee. Try to make some connection between the make-up of a boat and the architecture of churches.
- When were times when you felt the Church has been tossed by waves and winds? Where did you find God's presence/accompaniment during these times?



Let there be light...

On the Meaning of Christian Discipleship

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, 'If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple.

- Luke 14:25-26

Let us say for now that we are among the great crowds who were traveling with Jesus in the Gospel passage this Sunday. It is important for us to do this so that on a regular basis we can ask Jesus to challenge and help us discern the radical difference between the crowd and His community of Christian disciples. The two groups are not the same - they are very different. And what makes the crowd and the community of Christian disciples different?

One, a Christian disciple has unparalleled love and commitment to Jesus above anyone else, including one's beloved family members. Why? Because once a Christian disciple has experienced the love of Jesus, he or she cannot love in any other way. And because His love is divine, the love of Jesus seeks to elevate all loves, including familial love. The crowd is superficially interested in Jesus; the community of Christian disciples lives their committed to Jesus.

Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

- Luke 14:27

Two, the Cross of Jesus is the perfect sign of the unconditional love of God. It is love that is willing to suffer for the good of the other - even unmerited. It is love that is willing to give one's life so that the other may live - again, even unmerited. Therefore, to carry the Cross signifies following Jesus. And embracing the Cross of Jesus means to become a Christian disciple. The crowd does not bother itself with the Cross; the community of Christian disciples cannot but identify with the Cross of Jesus.

Which of you wishing to construct a tower does not first sit down and calculate the cost to see if there is enough for its completion?

Otherwise, after laying the foundation and finding himself unable to finish the work the onlookers should laugh at him and say,

This one began to build but did not have the resources to finish.'

- Luke 14:28-30

Third, a Christian disciple looks at the desired end, that is, eternal life with Jesus, and the way to achieve this, that is, the serious demands of Christian discipleship. A Christian disciple should find himself or herself repeatedly saying, "Now that I commit myself to Jesus for eternity, how must I live each day that shows my commitment to Jesus?" A Christian disciple is both accountable to Jesus and responsible to oneself. Such accountability and responsibility are important ingredients in giving witness to the Christian faith. The crowd may desire heaven but would not want to work for it or may only feel entitled to it; the community of Christian disciples help and encourage one another as they walk the narrow and less travelled road.



Or what king marching into battle would not first sit down and decide whether with ten thousand troops he can successfully oppose another king advancing upon him with twenty thousand troops? But if not, while he is still far away, he will send a delegation to ask for peace terms. In the same way, anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple."

- Luke 14:12-14

Lastly, a Christian disciple acknowledges his or her weakness and limited resources in comparison to how much God brings to the table. Here, we need to be clear - it is not that God does not want us to have a kingdom, rather God wants nothing less than His kingdom for us! It takes humility, of course, to recognize that what I offer to myself will always be lesser than what God offers to me, to us. The crowd is satisfied with the world; the community of Christian disciples see the limits of the world and rightly chooses the vast heavenly kingdom offered at their feet by God.

We are not the crowd. We are the community of Christian disciples who love Christ, embrace His Cross, walk the narrow path towards gift of heavenly kingdom.
